# **A Season of Renewal**

After gracing us with yet another incredible ski season (Alta Ski Area reported an astonishing season total of 628 inches of snow), the muted tones of Little Cottonwood Canyon's snow-covered mountains are quickly giving way to the vibrant colors and hues of a new season. Spring weather in Alta arrives at a time of its own choosing, but its brilliance is always worth the wait.

Spring in Little Cottonwood Canyon means an abundance of hiking and biking trails lined with breathtaking flora and fauna, rock-climbing spots that have helped sharpen the skills of world class athletes, including Olympic silver medalist in men's sport climbing, Nathaniel Coleman, beautiful destinations for the whole family like Cecret Lake and Lisa Falls, and a unique view of the Wasatch Mountains.

Such is Little Cottonwood Canyon, a true jewel of the Wasatch. Unfortunately, it is now firmly in the crosshairs of short-sighted thinking, greed, and the allure of a 'shiny toy' - UDOT's proposal to build the world's longest gondola in Little Cottonwood."

### Shiny Toy Syndrome

"Shiny Toy Syndrome refers to the tendency to focus solely on the development of the latest and greatest technological advancements without considering their actual impact on society or whether they truly serve a useful purpose...without necessarily delivering any real benefits or solving any meaningful problems."- Petek Kabakci, PMP, PCC

It's astonishing that a solution so vehemently opposed by the vast majority of Utahans retains its legs through what is tantamount to ignoring the will of the people, the actual data, and real world common-sense. As Henry Buckley famously stated, "The causes of mistakes are, first, I didn't know, second, I didn't think, third, I didn't care." Little Cottonwood Canyon deserves better.



**The Red Snake Letter** 

The General Manager of Alta Ski Area, Mike Maughan, recently composed a letter in response to UDOT's selection of Gondola Alternative B, titled the "Red Snake Letter." In the letter, Mr. Maughan points out that nothing in the UDOT's plan addresses any of the issues currently facing motorists. "Whether it's a gondola or it's toll lanes or it's buses," Maughan said, "none of those solutions as proposed are designed to replace the current vehicle volume level in the canyon."

One wonders, if UDOT and the Legislature aren't listening to the citizens of Utah, the elected officials of impacted cities, environmental agencies, or the General Manager of one of the two ski resorts set to "benefit" from the addition of a gondola, who are they listening to?

### Friends of Alta vs The Gondola

On December 4th 2023, Friends of Alta filed a lawsuit against UDOT's selection of Gondola Alternative B, to try and achieve a pause while additional analysis is performed. As Canyon Guard Chair and spokesperson, Craig Heimark stated: "We expect the lawsuit will create the time and space for Utah legislators to review and direct UDOT to consider and test cheaper and more effective transportation solutions by using the \$150M recently authorized BEFORE allocating additional taxpayer dollars or making a final decision."

In my view, litigation should only happen if and when all efforts have been exhausted. Lawsuits are costly, time consuming, and by definition, contentious. In an ideal world, common sense solutions and cooperation between agencies would render this lawsuit moot. Unfortunately, we live in the real world, and in the real world, we were forced to take a stand and say enough is enough. The time for action is now, and we have taken a stand to move forward. We need you to stand with us.



# **Black Rosy-Finch Study Recap**

Black rosy-finches reside in the Rocky Mountains, but you'll need to climb cliffs in the highest of mountains to spot one. Climate change is shrinking the rosy-finches' nesting habitat, which has caused many scientists to be worried. Without basic knowledge of their needs, it's difficult to know what to do to ensure these birds are resilient against climate change. Nearly every conservation organization and government agency recognizes rosy-finches are of highest priority for action.

Friends of Alta has been supporting the Black Rosy-Finch study conducted by the Utah Dept. of Wildlife Resources since March 2019. There is surprisingly little information on the Black Rosy-Finch bird species. While their cousin the Gray-Crowned Rosy-Finch migrates next to Canada, the Black Rosy-Finch nests here in the Albion Basin and in the Uinta Mountains. The reason for this is because the Black Rosy-Finch prefer high Alpine environments to nest.

This past season we witnessed an uptick in finches collected at the feeders compared to last year. For the 2022-23 season we noticed 0 Grey Crowned Rosy-Finches and 6 Black Rosy-Finches. We believe that was because of the amount of snow we had last season. For this season, we had 382 Grey Crowned Rosy-Finches and only 8 Black Rosy-Finches.



## We Need Your Financial Support To Preserve Alta And It's Environs

FOA, Canyon Guard v. Utah Department of Transportation (UPDATE)

Friends of Alta (FOA) filed its 95-page lawsuit on December 4, 2023. Salt Lake City, Sandy, and Metro Water District filed a separate lawsuit against UDOT on December 11. Save Our Canyons filed a third lawsuit on December 18, 2023. The complaints in each lawsuit have significant overlap, but each party wanted their own counsel.

In January, February, and most of March, the ten "different" attorneys had regular telephone calls to coordinate strategies. We also spoke with attorneys at Perkins Coie, which is a national law firm and outside counsel for the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT). In our discussions with Perkins Coie, we agreed to prepare a draft scheduling order.

On a separate track, the ten attorneys for the plaintiffs agreed on a motion to consolidate the cases, which has been submitted to the judge assigned to the case, Judge Tena Campbell, United States district judge of the United States District Court for the District of Utah. This consolidation will be helpful for logistics and as a cost saving measure for the plaintiffs.

All three lawsuits will follow the federal Administrative Procedures Act (APA). Under the Federal Court Rules, all cases under APA jurisdiction, like our case, are based on the administrative record created by the administrative agency being sued. In this instance, the two agencies being sued are

the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and UDOT. It is anticipated no significant activity will occur until June or July.

The Alta Gala is a collaborative fundraiser for Alta Community Enrichment, Friends of Alta & Alta Historical Society. This year was another record breaker for the Alta Gala! We sold out of tickets within 18 minutes to the Classic Gala Party and we were able to raise approximately \$14,000 for each organization.

During the Alta Gala, we were able to host another opportunity drawing this year. Participants had the chance to win two different prize packages. One option was for an Alta Ski Resort 2024-25 Season Pass and the other option was for one day Heli-skiing package with Powderbirds for two people.
